Jason absolutely adores the medium of radio and often co-presents Saturday Live on BBC Radio 4, chooses his Pick of the Week and made The Ely Estate documentary for Radio 4 in 2023. He's also presented the 2012, 2016 and 2020 (2021) Tokyo Olympic Games, the 2014, 2018, 2022 Commonwealth Games, FA Cup finals, FIFA World Cup finals and the Six Nations. Jason's also presented for Channel 4 Sport and the Rugby World Cup for S4C. He's made films for The One Show and co-presented BBC One's Crimewatch with Sophie Raworth and Kirsty

Young. Jason works between London, Salford and Cardiff and is a fluent Welsh speaker — appearing regularly on Welsh language television station S4C. He even has time for his own show on BBC Radio Wales-where he fronts a phone in show in the English language.

Jason has travelled the world with the BBC fronting TV coverage from Brazil to the United States to Australia and is equally at home interviewing Hollywood A-listers and music stars as he is chatting to the world's biggest football names.

Jason is the CEO of a media company that he founded and has recently created his own TV academy as part of that-nurturing the next generation of broadcasters. He's also a keen filmmaker having made many TV documentaries across the UK, Saudi Arabia, Ireland, Mexico, Egypt and presented two historic travel programmes from Jerusalem.

LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

It is a lasting tribute to Suzanne that her philosophy continues to underpin the bespoke care and support provided to each child and their family cared for by Tŷ Hafan so that every life, however short, is lived to the full and lasting memories are created.

Sharon and Rebecca's project to develop a community pathway for babies with jaundice is innovative and forward thinking.

Although in its early stages, the project is showing promising results and is being watched with anticipation across Wales, as this could be a model for the future.

The Care Closer to Home service provides care such as intravenous and intramuscular antibiotic administration, wound care, disimpaction support, respiratory support and central line care. They receive referrals from local hospitals and hospitals further afield (including Birmingham Children's Hospital and Great Ormond Street Hospital) meaning that children can be treated closer to home rather than being an inpatient so far away.

Recently, Sharon and Rebecca devised a new pathway for babies with jaundice. If successful, this will mean phototherapy and relative blood tests can be carried out at home. This pathway is revolutionary, and Aneurin Bevan University Health Board will be the only one offering this service. Families will be able to take their babies home and start their family life safely and comfortably with support.

Sharon and Rebecca are passionate and committed to the service and are eager to expand with more new pathways, meeting regularly with local paediatric consultants for discussions and approval.



Katie is a dedicated and inspirational registered children's nurse and health visitor, who took a pilot opportunity and made it her own, taking the outcomes and delivery above and beyond expectations.

Child and Adolescent Mental Health Service services in Betsi Cadwaladr University Health Board East Integrated Health Community, developed a Specialist Health Visitor role in the Early Years Team as a 12-month pilot project. Katie is still in post two and a half years later. having embraced the challenge with passion and energy.

Katie works closely with members of the multidisciplinary team, families and third sector parties. She has shown the ability to communicate at a high level and break down barriers, enhancing the skills of the wider health visiting workforce.

Katie qualified as a Registered Children's Nurse in 2001, then completed her Specialist Community Public Health Nurse qualification in 2005. Since 2013 she worked as a health visitor within Flying Start service, where she has been a champion for mental health and has organised and orchestrated health days, with a focus on parent-infant mental health.

Katie has a passion for early intervention and prevention, and through her work she has kept the child at the heart of all she does and empowered others to make a difference.

Kim has transformed the Community Paediatric Continence Service in Cardiff and Vale University Health Board from a medical model to one that is nurse-led.

This has significantly improved services for children and their families, with a more streamlined care pathway for all her patients.

The changes have broadened the service's remit and ensure that families are central to decision-making, and Kim has recruited and trained a multi-skilled team, improving waiting times and quality of service.

Referrals to the acute paediatric continence service have reduced as a full bladder assessment is undertaken where necessary, ensuring that only children with the highest need are referred, otherwise care is provided by the community team. Most recently Kim has been developing transition clinics for patients who need ongoing support from the adult continence service.

Waiting lists have reduced significantly by using a hybrid model for patient appointments-face to face, telephone, home visits and video consultation.

Knowledgeable and experienced across tertiary and community services, Kim is innovative, inspiring, approachable and trusted by her peers. She is the chair of the All-Wales Paediatric Continence Service, chair of the south west Paediatric Bladder and Bowel Group and a member of the Paediatric Continence Forum.

Joanne has delivered a transformational falls prevention service within primary care at Betsi Cadwaladr University Health Board, with a proactive approach to early identification of deterioration.

She has developed a value-based approach to promote best practice, reduce variation and focus on sustainable resources.

This has contributed to a 46% reduction in falls and 96% compliance with fall risk assessments.

In 2018 she extended the service to Wrexham locality care homes. Due to its success, Flintshire locality was aligned with the East team and a further 24 care homes were offered training and development. In 2021 Joanne rolled out the education to GPs, paramedics, specialist nurses, safeguarding, continuing health care teams and others.

Joanne has also developed a falls register dashboard, enabling multi professions to see what the patient has been offered. The register reduces duplication and can prevent people being on lengthy waiting lists only to find they needed a specific intervention. NHS Scotland is now keen to adopt this type of register.

Joanne's transformational work improves patient experience and reduces the risks associated with frailty. Her pioneering vision has been noted overseas, and her work will be contributing to a university research trial.

Catherine drew on the learning from the COVID-19 pandemic to bring vaccinations and immunisations closer to people's communities and homes and to improve vaccination rates across the health board.

Before the pandemic, Cath provided expert advice and support for all vaccination programmes across Swansea Bay, being the health board's only immunisation co-ordinator at that time. She was pivotal in implementing the mass vaccination programme.

She helped lead a social media campaign, encouraging retired registrants to return to the workplace to support the delivery of COVID-19 vaccinations, a campaign which was adopted by other health boards across Wales.

Cath's creativity led to setting up a mobile vaccine centre for hard-to-reach communities. She worked with external stakeholders to convert a mobile library into a mobile vaccination unit named the 'Immbulance.'

She worked with the communications team to bring the Immbulance to life via a social media and community partnership campaign. This led to a media interview on the flagship BBC television programme The One Show.

Cath secured the role of head of immunisation, where she has developed a strong dedicated multidisciplinary team and immunisation professionals that are proud to deliver training and educate the next generation of immunisers.

Julia has gone beyond her role of directly treating patients and upskilling mental health nurses in physical health interventions by establishing urgent pathways for safe and timely access to care.

A senior nurse for physical health in Cardiff and Vale University Health Board, she works in Mental Health Services for Older People and the All-Wales Neuropsychiatry Service.

Julia helped develop a one-day training programme for managing a deteriorating patient, which has made mental health nurses more competent and confident in urgent situations.

She has also identified a pathway for out-of-hours medical cover for inpatients. Historically, the inpatient wards were covered by the GP out-of-hours telephone service. But the advice provided was aligned to the community and not always suitable for complex medical situations arising in acute hospital systems.

Julia led a project which created a new procedure. Now, patients who fall or are medically unstable have a nominated hospital doctor on site who takes responsibility for clinical decisions – a situation which is better for patients and clearer for nurses.

Julia has driven improvements in falls prevention by delivering bespoke training which is due to be rolled out across the health board, she has led mass immunisation programmes and is passionate about infection prevention.

Registered Nurse - Learning Disabilities Award



Catherine consistently demonstrates a 'can do' attitude which has been particularly beneficial to her success in leading an innovative project, improving the health and wellbeing of individuals with a learning disability.

Her current project aims to increase the uptake and quality of the annual learning disability health check. This will help reduce health inequalities and avoidable and preventable deaths.

Through data analysis, Catherine identifies the areas of need and can target her support effectively, providing the right service at the right time to those who need it.

Sharing the evidence base and the need for change alongside delivering training packages to GP practice staff, Catherine has quickly built-up links with primary care colleagues. Current data shows that over 90% of people known to secondary care services have received an annual health check.

Catherine always goes over and above the requirements within her role. For instance, she has extended learning disability champion training to all departments within the health board.

She has also branched out to provide training to social care colleagues and the Welsh Ambulance Service alongside delivering sessions to practice nurses and newly qualified staff on the preceptorship programme. To date Catherine has trained over 500 learning disability champions and has many future sessions planned.

Katrina has transformed the service at Tŷ Lafant, the health board's specialist acute inpatient assessment and treatment unit for people with learning disabilities.

She became ward manager in April 2023 at an incredibly challenging time, following an unannounced Health Inspectorate Wales (HIW) visit which identified multiple concerns and need for improvements in several areas.

Alongside this were numerous safeguarding incidents, high levels of agency staff, high sickness and absence, a poor culture, low staff wellbeing and several key vacancies.

Katrina started as deputy manager and within months stepped up to acting ward manager and has completely transformed the service. Katrina has met the challenge with strength, humility, courage, openness, transparency, and compassionate leadership.

She has led and inspired a depleted, compassion-fatigued team with low morale through a challenging time amid much scrutiny; and they've developed into a cohesive team with the highest standards and pride in their work.

This was evidenced at a recent HIW inspection (April 2024), when there was no immediate assurance required and feedback was incredibly positive.

The inspectors specifically noted an improvement in the quality of leadership and management since the last inspection and made reference to staff, patients, families and wider members of the division accrediting all improvements to Katrina herself.



Registered Nurse - Mental Health Award



Corrinna is a pioneer for mental health nursing, who has led on organisational change and the review of memory services across the health board, reducing waiting times in dementia care by introducing a specialist nurse into her service.

Leading in the creation of cognitive stimulation groups for patients living with cognitive impairment, striving for parity of service delivery across all settings, enabling patients to be cared for at home for as long as possible.

Corrinna displays true leadership in recognising the strengths in her colleagues, encouraging them to reach their full potential through learning and mentorship, along with setting up wellbeing groups for staff, after recognising opportunities to improve retention within the team.

Corrinna has an excellent line management structure; she is seen as approachable and always willing to go the extra mile for staff and patients. Working with all levels throughout the health board Corrinna's inner sparkle is greatly valued.

Always being so proud to be a nurse, keen to make a difference and is self-inspired to be a devoted and compassionate role model to others. Through development opportunities and recognition work, Corrinna proudly accepted the team leader post and continues to shine in her role.



Madelaine has improved outcomes for an overlooked group of patients in a role which did not exist until four years ago.

In 2018 Madelaine worked on an audit which showed 18% of Mental Health Services for Older People service-users had primary problem of psychosis, and only 10% of those were accessing therapy

Further research showed 50% of community mental health staff wanted more training on psychosis.

Madelaine was tasked with piloting the clinical nurse specialist role. Her interventions improved people's access and engagement which significantly reduced their distress and enhanced their recovery. Funding was then secured to make the role permanent.

With no early intervention psychosis service provision for over 65s in Wales, Madelaine provides innovative evidence-based strategies, focusing on holistic and trauma-healing approaches.

Madelaine also developed a psychosis learning and development pathway for staff and provided training including the Hearing Voices Network approach, a peer-led worldwide approach to living alongside voices. She provides cognitive behavioural therapy, mindfulness, eye movement desensitisation and reprocessing and family interventions.

She has provided training and workshops to staff of all grades and is now developing reciprocal relationships with worldwide third-sector organisations.

Kiera is a dedicated and passionate advocate for person-centred palliative care. She works extra hours voluntarily and has raised more than £13,000 for the independent, six-bedded hospice unit.

Parachute jumps, mountain treks, coordinating and giving complementary therapies, baking and birthday fundraisers are all ways in which Kiera has helped raise money.

She leads by example, cleaning toilets or making breakfasts or shopping for patients' favourite foods, bringing in her clippers to shave someone's head-whatever is needed to deliver an excellent standard of care for patients, their families and friends.

She supports team members to develop their knowledge and skills, and she is continually developing her own knowledge and skills to ensure up-to-date evidence-based practice.

Kiera is a strong advocate for person-centred care within the team, promoting and enabling adaptability for team members to achieve a positive work-life balance, and extending compassion and holistic care to the team when needed.

Kiera is also committed to opening up conversations with the wider public about death and dying. She has addressed community groups through talks and workshops, and she is a Soul Midwife, offering non-clinical support for people and their families, as they face a terminal diagnosis.



Angela is making a significant contribution to developing sustainability in health care.

By embedding sustainability into leadership and training programmes, she is helping to change the way healthcare functions in the future to become greener and uphold the basic principle of what it is to be a nurse by doing no harm.

Angela has developed her own knowledge in this emerging subject by completing the Florence Nightingale Fund Green Healthcare Leadership Programme and the NHS leadership academy sustainability leadership for greener health and care.

She coordinated a webinar, bringing together Elysium Healthcare and the Welsh NHS health boards to discuss the climate crisis in the context of healthcare and its role in contributing to carbon emissions.

It also considered the link between climate change and biodiversity loss and the health of the population. Angela is instrumental in leading Elysium in Wales to think about the role of nurses and healthcare workers in mitigating against climate change.

She has researched the training provision by Elysium Healthcare and saved greenhouse gases (and money) by moving some closer to home and online.

Angela also developed and continues to deliver a programme for health care workers to advance their skills, working towards being leaders in their field, including sustainability in healthcare.

Diana works tirelessly to shine the light on underrecognised lymphoedema services to improve patient care.

Her focus is on training community nurses to manage lymphoedema effectively, preventing deterioration and reducing the need for secondary care intervention.

In her dual role, she collaborates with primary care providers, including general practitioners, district nurses and tissue viability nurses to implement the On the Ground Education Programme.

Her collaborative approach extends more widely to include the vascular and podiatry, creating new patient management and referral pathways. She has also provided training to breast-care nurses to help them spot the signs and symptoms.

She has developed standard operating procedures and clear governance for the service, including patientinitiated follow-up pathways. Her work has improved efficiency and fairness for patients and has improved the management of waiting lists.

Diana collects patient-reported outcome measures and patient-reported experience measures during every patient interaction. This patient-centred approach also ensures joint decision-making in relation to care plans and outcomes that truly matter to patients.

She faces difficult conversations with compassion and does this while managing a highly complex clinical caseload, always putting patients' needs first, and her dedication recently transformed the life of a housebound patient with severe mental health issues.



Since being appointed to his role as a Clinical Nurse Specialist two years ago, Tim has developed the role using evidenced-based practice.

He has introduced cognitive stimulation groups, which is the only evidence-based psychological intervention for dementia.

Tim is also trained in the Newcastle Model which provides a formulation of a person, their situation, their challenges, who they are as people and what's important to them within the context of their illness.

Tim has introduced music and dance sessions. to the ward by engaging local charities, and these have improved patients' mood and engagement.

He has also collaborated with university art students to provide art sessions, which has reduced stigma and raised awareness. The resulting work is currently on public display in the hospital foyer art gallery.

Tim is also leading on a new project on pain management. He was inspired by a Radio 4 programme about using facial recognition to detect pain, which is especially significant because pain can lead to high levels of distress, aggression or withdrawal in dementia.

The project outcomes will be measured via audit into pain assessment, antipsychotic usage, benzodiazepine use, pain relief and possible reduction in falls.

Sarah took the lead-under supervision of the qualified nurse - in developing the Cognitive Stimulation Group in Merthyr.

This group programme, designed to improve motivation, confidence and mood for people with mild to moderate dementia, was planned as a seven-week programme, but it has now been adapted for longer term international use.

Sarah supports these individuals to stay socially involved, and there are many examples of Sarah helping people to regain their confidence and ability to socialise in their community.

Sarah is described as a very caring, compassionate and empathetic support worker. She is friendly and an upbeat person and always sees the best in every situation, taking on challenges always to improve patient outcomes.

She is a team player who uses her initiative and is a very motivated member of staff. Sarah is proud of her profession and is seen as a role model to others.

In feedback, patients described her as 'a lifeline'. In working with patients with dementia, she has helped to bring person-centred care and an evidence-based approach to the forefront. She has shown a real understanding of the impact of dementia on patients and their families.



Having previously been a wellbeing adviser, Louise quickly adapted to a new role to become an accomplished immuniser in the Mass Vaccination Centre during the COVID-19 pandemic, providing education, advice, and health promotion.

At Trevethin Health Centre, Louise supports the nurse-led service when required, offering services including post-operative dressings, venepuncture, wound care and supporting chronic disease management clinics.

Louise has also helped and continues to work closely in the co-ordination of respiratory nursing, performing spirometry, pre-assessments, home oxygen post installation checks and supported the innovative spirometry hubs. Throughout the pandemic, she supported the oxygen team to undertake risk assessment and self-management advice in patients' homes.

She has accumulated a lifetime of experience and a wealth of recognition in Aneurin Bevan University Health Board, facing challenges head on, adapting her working style to meet the everchanging needs of the health service, making a lasting contribution in her field of work.

She has a positive personality, excellent communication skills and enjoys the teaching and development of other healthcare support worker staff and students, in self-management and disease management.

Jill has been a dedicated and influential nurse leader for over 40 years, with her impact reaching students, registrants and ultimately patients and their families throughout Wales and the UK.

Following time as a staff nurse and ward sister in London, Jill moved into education. She has worked tirelessly with stakeholders to implement evidence-based curricula that equip registrants for the demands of contemporary practice. She has taught at undergraduate and postgraduate level.

During her tenure as a nurse educator, Jill has overseen the implementation of several nursing curricula, as well as two notable milestones within the profession. During the early 1990s Jill was involved with the inception of Project 2000 which saw nurse education transition from hospitalbased schools into higher education institutions.

Latterly, Jill was at the vanguard of graduate nursing provision in Wales, collaborating with Professor Donna Mead OBE to develop and implement a BSc (Hons) Nursing course that saw its first graduates in 2000.

Her extensive knowledge of quality assurance, governance, and professional regulation processes have proven invaluable in ensuring Nursing and Midwifery Council standards are rigorously maintained. Nowhere is this more evident than in her instrumental work on the creation of the All-Wales Practice Assessment Documentation.

Recently, Lisa has led the creation of a coaching network to support newly promoted nursing

She showed outstanding leadership as the chair of the All-Wales Nurse Education Leads Group, resulting in significant improvements in patient care and nurse education.

Under her direction, the national Practice Learning Framework was implemented in January 2022, and she played a crucial part in the design of the Assistant Practitioner Governance Framework.

In 2023, she worked with others to enhance the student experience by introducing a senior education manager role to address student issues.

Lisa led the creation of a coaching network to support recently promoted nursing leaders, acknowledging the training deficiencies that had emerged due to the pandemic.

She devised a proposal to create the CAVUHB Centre of Excellence for Education and Organisational Development, which is planned to begin soon.

Emily is an exceptional student nurse who made a significant difference to a young patient's life when she initiated care in a stressful, emergency situation.

She was praised by paramedics who attended the scene of a hit-and-run where a 13-year-old boy had been seriously injured.

"Emily displayed such professionalism and quick thinking," they wrote. "Not only did she help take control of a very traumatic scene but the care she provided prior and post emergency service arrival was exemplary. She followed our instructions and continued to be an active part of the resuscitation and treatment of the patient until we left scene. In addition to this she remained at the scene and checked on others who witnessed the incident after the patient was transported to the University Hospital of Wales."

While Emily was dealing with the seriously injured accident victim, the offender also returned to the scene, tried to prevent the cardiopulmonary resuscitation and verbally assaulted her and others around. Despite this, Emily administered exceptional care going above and beyond what would be expected.

As part of the January 2022 intake of child student nurses, Emily has always been a conscientious student who has received glowing reviews from all clinical areas she has attended.



Student Nurses (Learning Disabilities), University of South Wales

Aimee and Claire help support the Teaching and Research Advisory Committee (TRAC) - an advisory group of men and women with learning disabilities, whose activities include interviewing, and teaching students in classroom and simulated settings.

This requires significant coordination, creativity, and support. One TRAC member describes Aimee and Claire as being dedicated and 'just brilliant to have around'. Feedback from students is that input from TRAC members significantly enhances their learning.

Aimee and Claire develop positive relationships with clinical settings, and feedback from their placements has always been exemplary.

Recently, Aimee and Claire have taken on the role of outreach workers to promote learning disability nursing, and the course at the University of South Wales (USW). They have liaised with key services such as Social Care Wales and Careers Wales to arrange workshops and presentations to various groups including social care, school and college students and care leavers.

They have promoted the field to over 1,000 individuals, which has had a significant impact on student numbers this year across Wales with USW reaching its commissioned number for September 2024.

Aimee and Claire are truly inspirational, passionate dedicated learning disability students. determined to make a real difference and improve the care for people with learning disabilities.

Jade has been a key figure in pioneering critical care research, both in Wales and globally.

She has held many roles in her 20 years in critical care, but her work in developing research practice across her health board has been nothing short of stellar.

She exemplifies the vision statement for her team-"Research matters; patients matter."

During the pandemic, Jade was the only member of her team allowed to enter the intensive care unit to deliver clinical trials which informed how COVID-19 patients were treated. Her work helped show that there was a survival advantage for patients prescribed a particular drug.

Jade has also facilitated groundbreaking research which has saved many lives and has been featured in a BBC report. She has had work published in some of the world's most prestigious journals including the New England Journal of Medicine. Yet she remains humble, kind, caring and professional.

Recently, Jade has been guest lecturing at Cardiff University where one student commented: "She is incredible, I want to be like her!". She is proud to inspire the next generation of nurses, medics and others, within the field of research.



Donna has taken new approaches to improve the care of frailty and dementia patients.

Using evidence-focused standards to continuously develop her team, she has shown how imaginative, low-cost interventions implemented into the heart of patient flow can truly make a difference.

Donna is always exploring innovative ways of driving practice forward and improving safety and outcomes for patients on the frailty ward, where she is senior sister. These include milkshake rounds, hydration, snack self-service, gardening, book and luncheon club.

She was pivotal in establishing 'Art in Health' weekly activities for inpatients living with dementia in Glangwili General Hospital (GGH). These include painting, pottery, pom pom making and prints, creating a better patient experience, with less boredom and isolation, and better cognitive stimulation and wellbeing.

Donna has also been pivotal in establishing the Frailty Assessment Unit in GGH in May 2024. Targets and performance have improved with Donna coordinating over 40 patients' assessments / admissions and 50% of them being discharged from the unit.

Donna is a thoughtful and committed nurse who always puts her patients first. She is willing to share her extensive knowledge and skills with others; she leads by example and is an excellent role model.

Shane has been instrumental in the creation of Wales' 111 Press 2 service for mental health support – which has greatly improved timely access to services.

Since its launch last year, the service has recruited over 100 staff and taken over 100,000 calls and has now been replicated across borders.

Shane, whose work on the 111 service was acknowledged in the Senedd, trained as a mental health nurse almost 30 years ago, after a period in HM Forces, and he has worked in clinical, managerial, and strategic roles in Wales and England.

In recent years he led on national reviews for the NHS and Welsh Government and has co-written papers on such areas as obesity and trauma in mental health hospitals.

During the pandemic, Shane was the co-lead of the national coordinating centre for mental health, alongside his core work in mental health commissioning.

He puts a strong emphasis on diversity, equality and inclusion-earning a team 'Silver Plus' award in Diverse Cymru's Cultural Competence Scheme.

Shane is a trusted and respected professional, who demonstrates a passion for mental health, a meticulous approach, a willingness to support others, tireless work ethic and, above all, modesty.



Bianca has developed a Community Same Day Urgent Care Service, recognised nationally for its success, representing excellent nursing practice and leadership.

Her efforts have given patients access to care closer to home, and reduced pressures at general hospital sites. Attendance currently averages 80 patients per day, with flexibility to visit patients in their own home as an outreach service. The service is highly valued by the community and Health Board.

Bianca is actively involved in research such as point-of-care testing in remote areas, to improve and enable timely safe care to be delivered to patients closer to home, and with working parties and focus groups on digitalisation of practitioners' portfolios and competency evidence.

She is active on forums in primary, community and urgent care across the UK and has recently started training as a learning and development and steward representative for the RCN.

She is a warm, authentic, energetic and visionary leader and an innovative and transformational senior nurse. Her work has reformed and refined the way the care of the patients in Hywel Dda University Health Board is provided.

Bianca is a creative and abstract thinker who drives results, while recognising the need for improving patient care, and investment in staff development.

Research, Innovation and Digitalisation in Nursing Award



Clare leads a programme of research, innovation and knowledge exchange which is making a difference to the lives of children and young people and to the organisation of health services.

Her early interest in human immunodeficiency virus took her to Romania where she worked with children and babies, and later with adults living with HIV in the West Midlands. Following periods working in sexual health, immunology and as a research nurse, Clare moved into her first academic role and later arrived in Cardiff in 2018, two years after completing her doctorate.

She now co-directs the Wales Centre for Evidence-Based Care, a JBI Centre of Excellence, which is an international research organisation which develops and delivers evidence-based information, software, education and training designed to improve healthcare practice and health outcomes, synthesising the evidence across a range of health care fields.

Success as a Winston Churchill Travelling Fellow cemented collaborations with colleagues in the Netherlands and led to two books addressing sexuality and relationships for children and young people.

Clare led a team examining digital interventions for adolescent sexual health and is co-leading a high-value research project on digital and inperson mental health crisis care for children and young people across England and Wales.

She has continued to contribute to the leadership field and co-edited the third edition of the influential book, Clinical Leadership in Nursing and Healthcare.

Catrin has led a transformational and awardwinning digital programme to enhance assessment, diagnosis and implementation of wound healing in the community across Swansea Bay University Health Board (SBUHB).

Catrin's background is working in plastics, transferring her knowledge and skills to community over a decade ago. Currently in a new role and a first for SBUHB, she is a professional nurse advocate and chair of the All-Wales District Nurse Forum.

When Catrin saw a social media tweet asking for a volunteer to trial a digital application for the management of wounds, the journey began. She was pivotal to the progression and implementation of the Minuteful for Wounds app to identify deteriorating, improving, and stagnating wounds earlier.

Since the introduction of the system, healing rates have improved and are above the national average of 15% for less than 12-week healing. With healing rates of 22% and 53% for district nurse and wound clinics respectively.

Collaborating with microbiology has improved antimicrobial stewardship, winning a Journal of Wound Care award and leading to reductions in antibiotic prescribing.

This work has been highly commended in Medisense Awards and won the CNO Sustainability Awards for the saving on carbon footprint reducing the need for travel and eliminating use of paper records.
