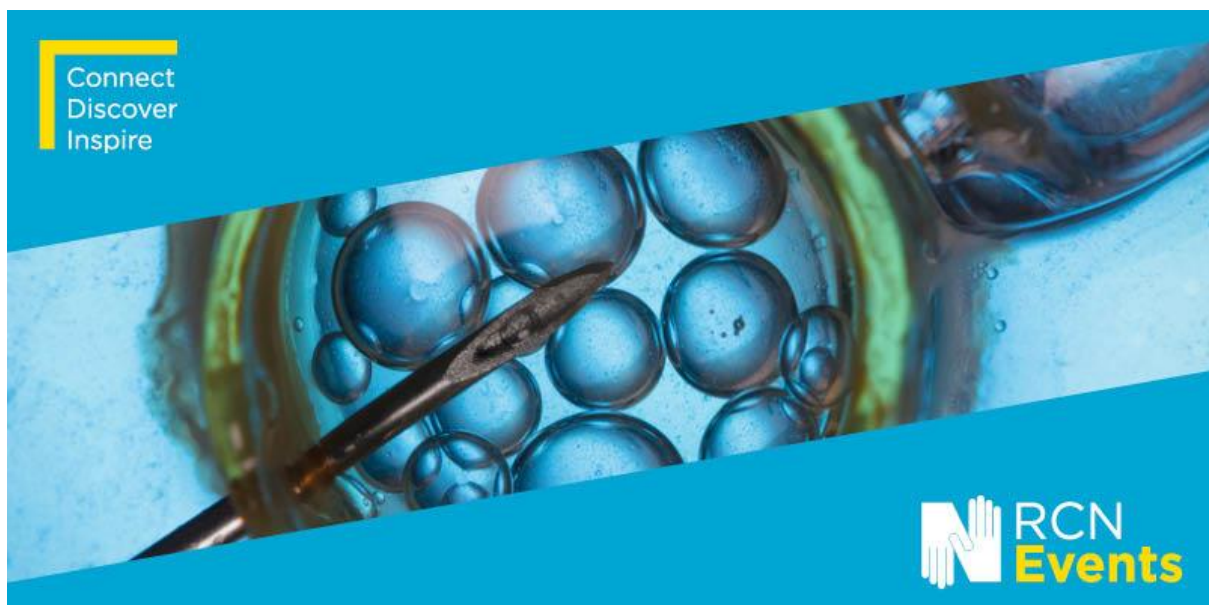

Biography

Francesca Steyn is a Fertility Nurse Specialist and the Clinical Services Manager of Wales Fertility Institute, the only NHS Fertility unit in Wales. She has over 19 years of experience in the fertility sector and is the current chair of the RCN Fertility Nursing Forum.

She has worked in various busy fertility units in both the NHS and private sectors and has had the opportunity to learn and develop a wide range of skills, including performing surgical sperm retrievals under consultant supervision, assisting with the management of the fertility needs of patients diagnosed with a blood borne virus, managing large donation programmes, leading and implementing surrogacy programmes and most recently, built out and developed a remote app based fertility care service.

Francesca has presented her work on an international level and has co-authored RCN publications and guidance for fertility nursing staff and published Department of Health guidance on surrogacy best practice and care in surrogate births. She was awarded surrogacy professional of the year in both 2018 and 2019 at the National Surrogacy Awards and was awarded the RCN Award of merit in 2023 for her contribution to nursing and the RCN. She is a member of the legislative reform advisory group, appointed by the HFEA to modernise the Human Fertilisation and Embryology Act and a member of the NICE Fertility problems: assessment and treatment (update) group.

Anne Howard, Deputy Director of Nursing, Peppy Health
Talk title: Technology and ultrasound – new guidance

Summary

This session aims to inform fertility nurses about the latest RCN fertility nurse forum publication - Ultrasound guidance for Fertility Nurses.

Manager for Care Fertility Birmingham and its satellite, Care Fertility Tamworth. Currently, she is currently the Deputy Director of Nursing for Peppy Health, a digital employee benefit that supports and educates employees about fertility, women's health, menopause, pregnancy, parenthood, and men's health.

Katie Rankin, Senior Fertility Nurse, Avenues

Talk title: Bringing the IVF clinic into the digital age

Summary

The integration of digital technologies and advanced patient and clinician applications into healthcare settings is revolutionising daily operations, offering significant benefits for both patients and nursing staff, and can ultimately improve outcomes, and patient experience. This presentation aims to explore how digitisation of processes can be integrated into fertility clinics, the challenges and barriers that may arise within the process, and provides an insight into the future of digital fertility nursing.

Learning outcomes

1. Explore ways in which digitisation of nursing care can improve the experience for both patients and nurses.
2. Identify challenges that may arise when digitising care and recognise how these challenges can be overcome.

Biography

Katie, registered Nurse and Midwife, is a dedicated Senior Fertility Nurse with 9 years of experience in healthcare, and just over 3 years in fertility and reproductive health. Katie provides compassionate and individualised care, whilst guiding individuals and couples through diagnostic investigations, treatment preparation and various fertility treatments. Katie is deeply committed to providing personalised, empathetic support, understanding the emotional and physical challenges her patients face. She stays current with advancements in reproductive medicine and is passionate about Pelvic Ultrasound, and how technology can improve the patients journey.

Talk title: Is fertility just a female problem, what about the men?



Summary

With so much of fertility support being aimed at women and with the focus of testing & treatment heavily focussed on women are we missing a major part of the puzzle? And if we're missing this part of the puzzle what does it mean for the men and ultimately the couple. Male infertility has a profound effect on men in many ways and this session aims to highlight why it is that we need more focus

on the male side to ensure both men and women are tested and supported properly.

Learning outcomes

1. That a (heterosexual) couples ability to conceive sits equally with them both and that they should therefore both be tested and supported equally.
2. The impact of male infertility has far reaching consequences for a man's self-esteem, self-worth and his mental wellbeing.
3. Further testing and support is available for the man and it could make all the difference to a couples chance of starting a family if it is offered at the right time by the right professional with the right support.

Helen Lake, Urology Specialist Nurse, The Urology Foundation

Talk title: Navigating Prostate Health and Fertility: Raising awareness of the challenges for older men aspiring to fatherhood

Summary

This presentation highlights the critical connection between prostate health and fertility in men over 45, a demographic where prostate issues, such as benign prostatic hyperplasia (BPH) and prostate cancer (PC), often begin to emerge. These conditions can significantly impact reproductive choices, making it essential for healthcare professionals, particularly in urology settings, to address these challenges.

As more men are starting families later in life or pursuing second families, understanding the onset of prostate problems becomes crucial for timely intervention and effective care. Nurses play a vital role in guiding men through treatment options, helping them make informed decisions that consider both prostate health and fertility goals. It is important for nurses to raise awareness about fertility options for older men, rather than assuming that fertility is not an issue due to age. Additionally, being aware that lifestyle factors such as diet and exercise can improve symptoms of prostatic enlargement and potentially minimise the need for pharmacological or surgical interventions – which can impact fertility – further equips nurses to support older men in maintaining both prostate health and fertility. This presentation aims to empower nurses with the knowledge needed to navigate these complex issues effectively.

Learning outcomes

1. Prostate Health and Ageing. Nurses will be able to identify and describe the key biological and medical changes in prostate function that occur as men age, with an emphasis on understanding common conditions such as benign prostatic hyperplasia (BPH) and prostate cancer (PC) and their potential impact on overall health.
2. Medical Management of Prostate Health. Nurses will be able to identify and describe common medical treatments and interventions for managing prostate health in older men, including pharmaceutical and surgical options, with a focus on understanding how these treatments may influence patient outcomes, including considerations for fertility.

3. Holistic Approaches to Prostate Care Nurses. will be able to identify, describe, and explain the importance of holistic approaches, incorporating diet and exercise, and how to integrate these strategies into patient care to support older men in achieving their goal of fatherhood and understanding the role of a healthy lifestyle in managing prostate conditions.

Helen has contributed to several peer-reviewed articles and RCN guidelines on male infertility.

Lyndon Miles, Consultant Embryologist, CARE, Cardiff **Talk title: Embryology, new technologies in the lab**

Summary

New technologies in the IVF lab are continuously evolving, aiming to improve success rates, ensure healthier pregnancies, and make the process more efficient and less invasive. Where are we now and where are we going?

Learning outcomes

1. Describe how the roll of the Embryologist is changing as technologies evolve
2. Describe the potential automation and streamlining evolving in the lab
3. Understand the potential future of genetics in the Embryology lab

Biography

Medical School, Boston, USA. He is experienced in performing preimplantation genetic testing (PGT).

Lyndon served for 5 years as a member of the Association of Clinical Embryologists Training and Examination Committee acting at a national level as an assessor for new members of the clinical embryology profession. He has presented at both national and international conferences. He has a special interest in making treatments and information more accessible to patients. He was until recently the Director of CRGW, a group of 5 clinics in Wales and the South West prior to the group being acquired by CARE fertility in 2023.

Rachel Cutting, Director of Compliance and Information, HFEA

Talk title: Patient information and role of the HFEA: getting to the right source

Summary

The HFEA is the UK's independent regulator of fertility treatment and research using human embryos. As well as ensuring high quality care is delivered in fertility clinics by licensing, monitoring and inspecting clinics, the HFEA has a statutory duty to provide impartial, accurate information and advice.

The HFEA website provides comprehensive information regarding all aspects of fertility treatment setting out the different treatment options and implications, including detailed information regarding the use of add-ons. Patients can access detailed information regarding individual clinics via our choose a fertility clinic tool. Many publications are also published on the website, including our annual fertility trends report and state of the sector. Our publications on family formations, ethnic diversity and donation gives valuable insight into our sector. With respect to signposting to the HFEA website we would expect clinics to inform patients of our information on add-ons (Code of practice guidance note 4.8). We encourage patients to access the HFEA website for accurate information especially as patients often find clinic websites over whelming. However, it is also imperative staff working within clinics access the HFEA clinic portal and knowledge base to ensure they are providing factual information in line with the law to patients.

Learning outcomes

1. Understand the role of the HFEA in providing impartial accurate information
2. Access the HFEA website and understand the information provided
3. Provide patients with accurate information

Biography

Rachel is the Director of Compliance and Information at the HFEA, the UK regulator of fertility treatments. Prior to this she worked as an embryologist for over 20 years, holding the position of Principal Embryologist and Person Responsible at Jessop Fertility. Rachel was Chair of Association of Embryologists from 2011 to 2014. She was involved in writing the national curriculum for training

embryologists and has written national guidelines for oocyte freezing and elective single embryo transfer. She was awarded an MBE in 2015 for services to infertility.

Linda Gillham, Certified Transactional Analyst, Linda Gillham Counselling **Talk title: How to manage your stress response**

Summary

This presentation explains the Polyvagal Theory (Porges, 1994) to help us to understand how our bodies react to both real and perceived stress. We know repeated exposure to stress is damaging for both our mental and physical health, and it can feel difficult to manage when you are stuck in a cognitive loop, polyvagal techniques can be helpful. The presentation will end with simple physical techniques for managing our stress response in our daily lives.

Learning outcomes

1. How our bodies respond to stress via our senses
2. Common symptoms of repeated and extended exposure to stress
3. Techniques to manage your stress

Shelly McGeeney, Clinical Fertility Nurse Specialist, UCLH

I am currently based at University College London Hospital NHS Trust as a clinical nurse specialist in the reproductive medicine unit which specialises in IVF, recurrent miscarriage and reproductive endocrinology. I have a senior role which entails the preparing of IVF treatment as well as the continuous support of patients undergoing the process. I am qualified in undergoing follicular ovarian response and endometrium monitoring via sonography.

My overall background began as a staff nurse within gynaecology and early pregnancy in 2008 and in 2010, I underwent my first role as a fertility nurse. I have now worked myself up to a senior nurse practitioner within the field of reproductive medicine.

In addition to my part time position at the reproductive medicine unit, UCLH. I am a private fertility nurse specialist for two highly renowned obstetric, gynaecology and reproductive medicine consultants. I carry out the care and planning for all private IVF treatment cycles for their patients as a self-employed role.

Nicola Benton, Unit Nurse Manager, Wales Fertility Institute

Having worked throughout Women's Health in the Welsh NHS for the past 37 years I have been fortunate to have had the opportunity of developing professionally and maintaining a good work life balance. Whilst becoming involved with the secondary care fertility and the IUI service in 2009 as a Fertility Nurse Specialist, I gained my Honours Degree in Enhanced Professional Practice focussing on advanced nurse practice.

In 2012 the Welsh funding body commissioned a full NHS reproductive health service for Wales. Satellites for BCRM initially in treating patients, coordinating and monitoring IVF cycles I gained skills in pelvic ultrasound along with BFS accreditation. I was involved in the development of the Wales Fertility Institute as the Fertility Nurse Specialist and we treated our first IVF patients in 2013.

Personal and Professional development is at the forefront of our nurse team. As the Unit nurse Manager I gained Pelvic ultrasound Msc from Edgehill University and currently undertaking training in embryo transfer.

The management and development of the nurse team is both rewarding and motivating, and my development of structured nurse reflective meeting was recognised in the Wales Chief Nursing Awards. I am passionate about supporting the nurse team, considering the RCN Education and Career Progression Framework as instrumental in achieving this as a manager in conjunction with my own professional development.
