Biography

Tendai Gwenhure trained as an ophthalmic nurse at Moorfields Eye Hospital in 2001. Prior to this, she worked abroad as a nurse manager at a private eye centre. In addition to managing staff and overseeing the clinical and surgical activities, she was also involved in charity work, collaborating with local and international charity organisations to run rural eye camp programmes to underserved communities. Upon completion of the ophthalmic course, Tendai worked in the Ophthalmic Accident and Emergency department, starting off as a D grade staff nurse, then progressing to become an ophthalmic emergency nurse practitioner and an A&E sister in 2005. Within this role, she was actively involved in the delivery departmental teaching sessions and staff training.

Because of her passion for staff education and training, Tendai moved into the Clinical Educator role at Moorfields Eye Hospital in 2014. With the introduction of the PGCert in Clinical Ophthalmic Practice programme at UCL Institute of Ophthalmology in 2014, Tendai has been a faculty member and she is currently the programme lead. She holds an MA in Practice Education and is a Fellow of the Higher Education Academy. She is an advocate for lifelong learning and nursing research. Her research interests are mainly around workforce development and enhancing student learning experience. She has received nominations from UCL for Student Choice Award for Excellent Personal Tutoring and Inspiring Teaching and Delivery. In 2019, she won the Student Choice Award for best lecturer for the PGCert Ophthalmic Practice programme for 2014-2018.

Tendai has been involved in Nurse Practitioner and GP training programmes for managing eye conditions. She has also been involved in STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering Arts and Maths) projects and youth employment schemes with local schools to promote careers in healthcare. She has presented at several conferences both nationally and internationally and has had multiple journal publications. As part of her master's programme, she has conducted a research project to evaluate a local induction course and she is currently undertaking her DProf.

Tendai has global networks, working with charities including Abalon Trust, Eye Health Africa and Global Health Lecturers' Network to promote eye health and support ophthalmic education in marginalised communities. She is also a member of the World Association of Eye Hospital (WAEH) communities of practice for nurses, sharing best clinical practice and best strategies for ophthalmic nurse training and education. Locally, Tendai is involved in community engagement activities focusing on the promotion of eye health and empowering nurses through education and training.

Talk title: The role of the Advanced Ophthalmic Emergency Nurse Practitioner in A&E

Summary

The Role of the Advanced Ophthalmic Emergency Nursing Practice in A&E talk:

- Explores the evolution of ophthalmic nursing from its origins to the present, looking at how societal changes, technological advancements, and population demographics have influenced the demand for this specialized care.
- Discusses historical milestones and the increasing prevalence of eye-related health issues such as cataracts, glaucoma, and macular degeneration, which may explain the growing demand.
- The specific responsibilities of advanced ophthalmic nurses in emergency settings, and their collaborations with other healthcare professionals.
- Identifies the educational pathways, specialized ophthalmic training and competencies needed for advanced ophthalmic nursing roles.
- Discusses Scope of Practice and Boundary Expansion, exploring traditional ophthalmic nursing roles and how these have expanded in recent years.
- Promotes leadership, critical thinking, and emotional intelligence in advanced ophthalmic nurses, encouraging a holistic, compassionate approach to patient care.
- Elevate the visibility and importance of ophthalmic nursing within the broader healthcare system and contributes to shaping policies, guidelines, and educational standards for the profession.

These objectives aim to provide a comprehensive understanding of advanced ophthalmic nursing, its role in emergency care, the qualifications needed, and the importance of expanding the scope of practice to meet growing healthcare demands.

Learning outcomes

1. Understand of the Role of Advanced Ophthalmic Emergency Nurse Practitioner
2. Understand the career pathway, education and skills required for this role
3. Know the importance of Ophthalmic Nursing care and its role in meeting the evolving ophthalmic care demands of our growing and ageing population.

Talk title: Revolutionizing Cataract Care: How clinical staff and Dora, the AI Clinical Conversational Agent, are transforming patient interaction at Oxford Eye Hospital

Summary

The integration of DORA into cataract care is transforming patient interactions and enhancing collaboration between clinical staff and technology. DORA, an automated clinical telephone assistant addresses several key challenges and provides significant benefits to both healthcare providers and patients. The overall objective is to improve efficiency, accuracy and accessibility of the pre-operative assessment process, while enhancing patient experience and reducing burden to healthcare and admin staff.

Human factors, such as trust in artificial intelligence system, effective communications and maintaining a patient-centered approach, are critical in ensuring successful outcomes. By blending DORA capabilities with the expertise of clinical staff, cataract care is becoming precise, efficient and tailored to individual patient needs, ultimately revolutionising the patient experience.

Learning outcomes

1. Participants will understand how DORA streamlines care processes, allowing clinical staff to spend more time on personalised patient-centered interactions, leading to improve patient satisfaction and outcome.
2. Participants will recognise the importance of human factors such a building trust in DORA, maintaining effective communication and ensuring patient engagement, which are critical to the successful integration of AI in cataract care.
3. Attendees will explain how staff engagement influences the successful implementation and operation of processes, leading to improved efficiency, enhanced care and better patient outcomes.
