Mrs Simphiwe Sesane - Medical Educator, Exeltis UK, Founder and CEO: Black Nurses & Midwives UK

Talk title: Keynote: Navigating pathways: My career journey of growth and discovery

She has a special interest in Contraception, Menopause, Black maternal health and improving Sexual and Reproductive Health access for marginalised and vulnerable groups.

Dr Gwenne McIntosh - Head of Health Sciences, University of Stirling, Scotland Talk title: Capturing patient feedback and using it to improve healthcare services

Summary

Nurses use patient feedback to guide person-centred care or to inform healthcare decisions. Feedback from people who use services is central to understanding, evaluating and improving their healthcare experiences. This presentation will provide an overview of the strategies available to capture patient feedback and offer guidance on how nurses can make use of feedback to promote healthcare improvement.

Learning outcomes

- 1. To identify the purpose and value of gathering feedback from people who use services and their families.
- 2. To describe the range of strategies that can be used to gather feedback from people who use services and their families.
- 3. To outline the role that nurses have in the collection, analysis and evaluation of feedback to improve healthcare quality.

Charlotte Glynn - Lead Nurse, British Pregnancy Advisory Service (BPAS)
Talk title: Contemporary issues in abortion care: Navigating challenges and improving practice

Summary

The development of the role of nurses and midwives in abortion care is progressing at speed but is limited in England, Scotland and Wales due to legislation. Decriminalisation is a main focus of abortion care providers and pro-choice activists, to ensure abortion is treated as the healthcare procedure it is and not a piece of legislation resulting in the inappropriate punishment of women. The issues of decriminalisation and the increased involvement of nurses and midwives in abortion care are closely linked, and this session will summarise the past, present and future of nurses and midwives when it comes to abortion care.

Learning outcomes

- 1. The role of nurses and midwives in the abortion care
- 2. How the role of nurses and midwives in abortion care can develop currently
- 3. How the role of nurses and midwives could develop further if abortion was decriminalised

Esther Kuria - Nurse Consultant Gynaecology, Guys & St Thomas NHS Foundation Trust Talk title: Advances in gynaecological cancers

Summary

Gynaecological malignancies account for approximately 11% of newly diagnosed cancers both nationally and globally, cervical, endometrial, and ovarian cancers rank among the most common cancers. Cervical and ovarian cancers, in particular, are notable causes of death worldwide. While most endometrial cancers are diagnosed at early stages, mortality rates have been increasing since 1997. The presentation will look at some of the pathways & innovative treatments in use and their impact on the nursing workforce.

- 1. To gain knowledge & understanding of cancer in context in the UK
- 2. To describe the cancer pathways for gynaecological cancers
- 3. To discuss some of the latest innovations and services in gynaecology cancer management
